

Just Call Him Goose

Since porch and desk geese have been bringing a lot of joy, I thought we could use an adventure goose, an emotional support goose, a little buddy to hang out with when we could use a friend.

Materials and Details

- Yarn: worsted weight in small amounts
Sample: Red Heart Super Saver Soft White, Pumpkin
- Crochet Hooks: F (3.5mm), H (5mm)
- Supplies: Yarn needle for weaving in ends, stuffing and poly pellets (or just stuffing), 2 tiny safety eyes (or black buttons with needle and thread)
- Optional: Measuring tape, scissors, 3 glass aquarium rocks (approximately 1" each)
- Gauge: Not needed for the project
- Measurements: Body - 4.5" tall x 3" at widest point; Legs - 4" long

Tips

- The first stitch of each row is worked into the same stitch as the turning chain unless noted.
- Numbers at the beginning of each line may refer to steps and not indicate number of rows.
- Stitch count remains the same unless noted at end of row/round.

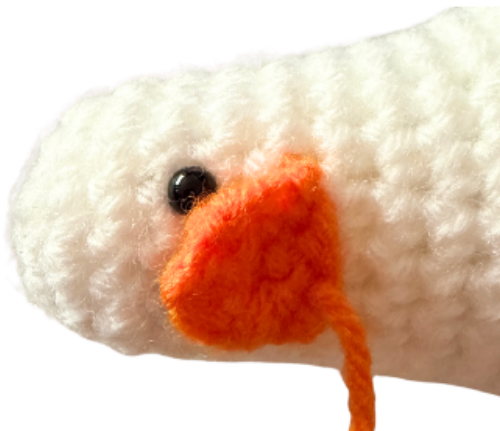
Beak (make 1)

1. Leave a long tail in the beginning to use for sewing in place when needed. With an F hook and worsted weight yarn (Sample: Pumpkin), ch 5, sc in the 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across. (4sts)
2. Ch 1, turn, sc2tog, sc2tog. (2sts)
3. Ch 1, turn, sc2tog. Finish off and weave in end. Set aside.

Goose

This starts at the top of the head.

1. With an H hook and worsted weight yarn (Sample: Soft White), start with a magic loop of 6 sc sts (or preferred method for starting a circle of 6 sc sts), pull closed and place a marker for working in the round. (6sts)
 2. 2sc in each st to end of round. (12sts)
 3. *sc, 2sc in the next st*, repeat to end of round. (18sts)
 4. Sc in each st to end of round.
 5. Repeat the previous round for an additional 6 rounds.
 6. *2sc in the next st, sc 2*, repeat to end of round. (24sts)
 7. *2sc in the next st, sc 11*, repeat once. (26sts)
 8. *2sc in the next st, sc 12*, repeat once. (28sts)
 9. *2sc in the next st, sc 13*, repeat once. (30sts)
- Stop and add the face at this point. Insert 2 safety eyes approximately 5-6 rounds from the top of the head.
 - With a yarn needle, use the yarn tail from the beak to sew the beginning edge below the eyes.
Tip: The sample beak was sewn upside down first (see photos below) and then folded down. This helps the beak point out away from the goose.



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10. Sc in each st to end of round.

11. Repeat the previous round for an additional 2 rounds.

Stop and stuff the goose. Stuff the top half with stuffing. If poly pellets will be used, place those in a baby sock or nylon first to prevent the pellets from working through stitches. If poly pellets will not be used, stuff the full body with stuffing.

12. *sc2tog, sc*, repeat to end of round. (20sts)

13. *sc2tog*, repeat to end of round. (10sts)

Finish stuffing the goose. If you want additional weight for the goose, a few craft/aquarium gems could be added.

14. *sc2tog*, repeat to end of round. Finish off, leaving a long tail for sewing.

With a yarn needle, use the yarn tail to weave in and out of the remaining sts. Pull to close and secure the yarn.

Legs (make 2)

These start at the feet.

Tips: For longer or shorter legs, adjust the amount of chains at the beginning of step 3.

For straight legs, on step 3 sl st in each ch back to the foot.

1. With an H hook and worsted weight yarn (Sample: Pumpkin), start with a magic loop of 6 sc sts (or preferred method for starting a circle of 6 sc sts), pull closed and place a marker for working in the round. (6sts)

2. *ch 3, sl st in the 2nd ch from hook, hdc in the 3rd ch, sl st in the next st on the circle*, repeat 2 more times, sl st 3 on circle.

3. Ch 15, sl st in the 2nd ch from hook, sl st in the 3rd ch, *3sc in the next ch, sl st 2*, repeat to end of ch, sl st in the same st on the foot. Finish off and weave in ends.

With a yarn needle and matching yarn, sew the end of the chain against the bottom of the goose. TIP: Check how the feet will hang before sewing the legs in place.



7" Goose Sunhat

1. With an H hook and worsted weight yarn, start with a magic loop of 6 sc sts (or preferred method for starting a circle of 6 sc sts), pull closed and place a marker for working in the round. (6sts)

2. 2sc in each st to end of round. (12sts)

3. *sc, 2sc in the next st*, repeat to end of round. (18sts)

4-5. Sc in each st to end of round.

6. Sl st in the next st. This is the new beginning of the round. Each round will be joined from this point on. Ch 1, hdc in the same st, hdc in the next st, 2hdc in the next st, *hdc 2, 2hdc in the next st*, repeat to end of round, sl st to join. (24sts)

7. Ch 1, FPSC around each post to end of round, sl st to join.

8. Ch 1, *hdc, 2hdc in the next st*, repeat to end of round, sl st to join. (36sts)

9. Ch 1, *hdc, 2hdc in the next st*, repeat to end of round, sl st to join. (54sts)

10. Sl st in each st to end of round. Finish off and weave in ends.

Chin straps: with an H hook and matching yarn, sl st in a st (from the ridge created by step 6) on the inside of the hat. Ch 30. Finish off and tie a small knot in the end. Repeat for the second strap, directly across from the first one.
